From the South – George Maultsby J.W. Our Ancient Friend and Brother the Great Pythagoras

"Born in 570 B.C, Pythagoras of Samos was an ancient Ionian Greek philosopher. Known as a famous mathematician and scientist, Pythagoras's religious and political teachings have also been said to influence the philosophies of famous Greek Philosophers such as Plato and Aristotle.

One of his most notable achievements was to create the 'Pythagorean brotherhood' which influenced the likes of Plato and Aristotle and contributed hugely to the development of mathematics. Pythagoras although attributed to the Pythagoras theorem (although contrary to common belief, he was probably not its inventor, his students or followers were). He also developed a theory about music using numbers, which shows just how profound and personal his use of numbers was. While today it's difficult to separate his achievements from those of his students, his legacy is undoubtable.

A lot is known by the average person about his mathematical works but his philosophical ideas are less well known, even though he had some influence on other Greek philosophers of great notoriety. For example, Pythagoras defined the doctrines of 'metempsychosis'. This talked about the idea and belief that the soul is immortal and that after death a soul is transferred to a new body.

Another notable contribution of Pythagoras' was mysticism. He believed that planetary bodies had a harmony of spheres and thus moved in accordance with mathematical equations. Such was the power of the idea that it was proven centuries later by Isaac Newton.

Pythagoras wasn't all about number crunching though, he also had an interest in the metaphysical too. He had plenty of ideas about the properties of numbers beyond their mathematical value. For example, he held the belief that odd numbers were masculine while even numbers were feminine."

"Do not go to bed until you have gone over the day three times in your mind. What wrong did I do? What good did I accomplish? What did I forget to do?"

"Friends are as companions on a journey, who ought to aid each other to persevere in the road to a happier life."

- "A fool is known by his speech; and a wise man by silence."
- "Choose rather to be strong of soul than strong of body."
- "Educate the children and it won't be necessary to punish the men."
- "Above all things, respect yourself."
- "Concern should drive us into action and not into depression."

Elias Ashmole—May 23, 1617-May 18, 1692:

October 16, 1646: "I was made a Free Mason at Warrington in Lancashire, with Coll: Henry Mainwaring of Karincham in Cheshire."

Elias Ashmole was a politician, military officer and collector. He was a founding member of the Royal Society, and his collections and manuscripts created the Ashmolean Museum at Oxford University. In 1638, while living in London, he qualified as a solicitor. He received a Doctorate in Medicine from Oxford in 1669 at lived at the University for a number of years.

He married Eleanor Mainwaring in 1638 but she died in 1641. At the outbreak of the English Civil War, he left London and lived with his father-in-law, Peter Mainwaring until 1644. Throughout the 1650s, Ashmole studied alchemy and in 1650 published *Fasciculus Chemicus* under a pseudonym. Around the same time, he met botanist John Tradescant the Younger and financed the publication of Trandescant's catalogue. In 1660 he was appointed The College of Arms and focused his studies on the history of the Order of the Garter publishing *The Institution, Laws and Ceremonies of the Most Noble Order of the Garter* in 1672, a book he wrote while "living in the country" to escape the Great Plague of 1665.

Ashmole was recognized as a Freemason in his own time and seems to have joined for several reasons including fellowship, interest in antiquarianism, and his search for universal knowledge.

The Ashmolean Museum at Oxford, which houses his collections and books, is considered to be the first truly public museum in Europe. Ashmole died on May 18, 1692, at his home. He is interred at St. Mary's Church, Lambert. He had no children. Prior to his death, he utilized home cures including hanging three spiders around his neck which "drove my Ague away."

On October 16, 1646, Ashmole wrote in his diary: "I was made a Free Mason at Warrington in Lancashire, with Coll. Henry Mainwaring of Karincham in Cheshire." He appears to have been relatively active and his diary entry of March 10,1682, reads: "About 5 H: P.M. I received a Sumons [sic] to appear at a Lodge to be held the next day, at Masons Hall London. On March 11 he wrote: "Accordingly, I went . . . I was the Senior Fellow among them (it being 35 years since I was admitted) . . . We dyned at the Halfe Moone Taverne in Cheapside, at a Noble Dinner prepared at the charge of the New-accepted Masons." Ashmole's diary entries are the earliest personal references to Freemasonry in England.
